My colleagues, Alex Molnar, Christopher Saldaña, and I are researching the history and development of Summit Public Schools and the Summit Learning Program. Our research covers the period from the founding of Summit Public Schools (in 2003) to 2019 when T.L.P. Education (aka "Summit Learning") took over the Summit Learning Program.

Dear Summit Public Schools:

Pursuant to the California Public Records Act (Government Code §§ 6250 *et seq.*), we are requesting copies of public records, including but not limited to any written materials, photographs, electronic data, and communications, related to certain educational programs and services provided to youth enrolled in schools operated by Summit Public Schools or in schools that contracted with Summit Public Schools to use the Summit Learning Program. Specifically, we are requesting the public records specified in Attachment A, as defined by Government Code § 6252(e) in the possession of Summit Public Schools, pursuant to California Education Code § 47604.1, as amended by California SB 126 (2019). Document requests are for period 2003-2004 academic year through the 2019-2020 academic year.

This request does not seek personally identifying information about any individual served by Summit Public Schools or the Summit Learning Program. To the extent such personally identifying information is contained in responsive records, please redact the identifying information and produce the remainder of the records. If you determine that any other information qualifies for an exemption from disclosure, please note the basis for the claimed exemption, redact the material at issue for the time being, and make the rest available as requested. Please also provide a signed notification citing the legal authorities on which you rely if you determine that any responsive information is exempt and will not be disclosed.



Dear Ms. Boninger:

Summit Public Schools is in receipt of your public records request received November 5, 2019. It is our understanding that you have requested more than 60 unique categories of information, including more than 120 subcategories of information spanning our nearly two decades of operation with the expectation that some or all of the information requested constitutes a public record under California law. We respond to inquiries from the public through informal requests for information and through requests under the Public Records Act. This request is atypical.




We deem it necessary to inform you of the sheer volume of potentially responsive documents in order to responsibly manage our resources (and likely your resources as well). After conferring internally, we are of the opinion that the potential universe of documents is unreasonably voluminous. Under the California Public Records Act, the public interest in obtaining records must be weighed against the fiscal and workload burden being imposed upon a public agency by a particular request. The amount of resources required to review and process your request could cause serious, irreparable harm to our organization as we strive to focus our attention on the needs of our students.

By sharing the specific topic(s) of your concern, we can limit the significant staff time and resources that I presently estimate the request, as currently presented, will consume.

At this point, we presently estimate that production of responsive records will be available for your review on or around July 1, 2020. As you are aware, prior to releasing any documents to the public, Summit ensures that we do not disclose exempt or privileged information, including personally identifiable information about students, information concerning pending litigation, and certain information about personnel.

**Additional Information Relating to the Production of Records**

**Drafts.** The California Public Records Act exempts from disclosure “preliminary drafts, notes, or interagency or intra-agency memoranda that are not retained by the public agency in the ordinary course of business, if the public interest in withholding those records clearly outweighs the public interest in



disclosure". One or more documents, arguably responsive to the Request fall within this exemption. The draft document(s) not routinely retained by Summit reflect internal comments, questions, and discussions among Summit staff. To produce such documents would have a chilling effect on open and frank discussion among staff as to these matters. It is also possible that such draft document(s) fall within the deliberative process privilege.

***New Records.*** The California Public Records Act requires charter schools and entities managing a charter school to provide records kept in the ordinary course of business related to the operation of a charter school. Summit Public Schools has no obligation under the Public Records Act to run a query or run of data, which would create a new record that Summit does not keep in the ordinary course of business. Further, the California Public Records Act does not create an obligation to create or obtain a particular record when the document is not prepared, owned, used, or retained by the public agency.

***Scope of Request.*** The California Public Records Act requires that requests describe the records sought with sufficient detail to allow a Summit employee familiar with the subject area of the request to locate the records with a reasonable amount of effort. Several of the categories and subcategories listed in the request do not adequately describe the records sought. Accordingly, we are unable to process such requests at this time. If you wish to pursue your request, please clarify the record you seek. In the event we do not receive your written response clarifying what records you are looking for within 10 business days from the date of this letter, we will presume you are no longer interested in pursuing such a request and we close the matter from further action. Please note that the clarified request, if any, may be subject to an exemption or privilege from disclosure under the California Public Records Act.

***Charter School Operations.*** To the extent an entity managing charter schools, such as Summit, engages in activities that are unrelated to a charter school, the California Public Records Act does not apply to the unrelated activities unless otherwise required by law.

***Fees.*** You have asked us to waive the fees for processing on the grounds that the "...information is not sought for commercial purpose and its disclosure serves the public interest in ensuring the welfare and education of children and youth." Based on all available information, your request does not contain enough evidence to support your request for a fee waiver. We will provide an estimate of the fee should you wish to proceed with your request. Please note that the fee will include (1) search time; (2) review time; (3) duplication and scanning on a per page basis; and (4) shipping and handling.

Dear Mr. Ogbu:

Thank you for your December 3, 2019 letter in response to our November 5, 2019 Public Records Act request, and for the helpful chart (Exhibit A) you provided.

We are heartened to learn that Summit Public Schools responds to inquiries from the public through informal requests for information as well as through requests under the California Public Records Act. Perhaps you are unaware that we initially spoke with a representative of Summit Public Schools by phone on October 16, 2019, to informally request information. We have retained the subsequent email correspondence in which we were told that the Summit Public Schools senior leadership team had determined that it would not accommodate us by having an informal conversation related to our requests. Nevertheless, we were and continue to be open to informal conversations with relevant Summit Public Schools representatives to gather the information we are seeking.

We also appreciate the invitation, in your letter, to share the specific topics of our concern so that we can limit the staff time and resources required to fulfill our Public Records Act request. Below, we have provided a detailed response to issues you raised in your letter.

We are unaware of any authority for your assertion that we must respond within 10 business days of receiving your December 3, 2019 letter. We would therefore appreciate your providing the basis for your assertion. Notwithstanding our view that there is no requirement for us to reply to you within 10 days, we have responded to each of the elements of your chart in the attached edited Exhibit A. We believe you will find our requests to be both reasonable and precise.

To be clear, we are requesting neither drafts (i.e., "preliminary drafts, notes, or interagency or intra-agency memoranda that are not retained by the public agency in the ordinary course of

business”) nor new records (i.e., a “query or run of data, which would create a new record that Summit does not keep in the ordinary course of business”).

In the attached edited Exhibit A, we clarify our requests for records relating to Charter School Operations. In your letter you assert that Summit Public Schools does not have to respond to queries about activities that are unrelated to a charter school, specifically requests #16, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 31, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 53. These requests bear on the Summit Public Schools’ creation and use of the Summit Learning Program and the Summit Learning Platform. We reject the assertion that records related to the Summit Learning Program and the Summit Learning Platform, created by and implemented by the Summit Public Schools, may be lawfully excluded from a public records request made to Summit Public Schools under SB 126 (2019). We find the public record to be clear: The Summit Learning Program and the Summit Learning Platform were created by Summit Public Schools, are used by Summit Public Schools in its educational programming, and were part of the Summit Public Schools, a public entity, during the years for which records are requested. As such, we believe these records are related to Summit Public Schools’ operations and are within the scope of the California Public Records Act under SB 126 (2019).

Additionally, you noted that for requests # 13, 17, and 18, the information requested is available in the public record on the California Department of Education’s (CDE’s) DataQuest / Dashboard. This is not completely accurate. We sought the answers to our questions in the California Dashboard and the CDE’s DataQuest database; and, because three Summit Schools are in Washington, the Washington Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction’s Washington State Report Card and the Washington State Charter School Commission’s Performance Framework Reports. Although some of the requested data can be found in those places, not all of it can be. Also, it appears that some of the information in the public record may be inaccurate. For example, the California DataQuest database reports that Summit Prep had a 0% college and career readiness rate for the 2007-2008. That seems unlikely. We will provide you documentation of what is available in the public record next week in Exhibit B. We request that you review that documentation, correct any errors in the public record, and provide any information that is unavailable in the public record. It is in the public interest as well as the interest of Summit Public Schools that the data we publish is accurate.

Regarding fees, the University of Colorado is a nonprofit public institution, and we are conducting policy research of considerable importance and public interest related to the nature, scope, and efficacy of personalized learning programs. We see no basis in the statute for levying charges for search time or review time. Please clarify the authority on which you rely for asserting the right to charge fees for these activities, as well as an explanation for why you expect it to take as long as you suggest to conduct a diligent search for documents responsive to each of the requests we have made. Please provide also the job titles of personnel required to fulfill the requests, their respective rates of pay, and the time required by personnel in each job category to produce the records requested.

Given the clarifications we provide in the attached edited Exhibit A, the forthcoming Exhibit B, and our willingness to discuss them with you informally, a July 1, 2020 date for producing the responsive documents appears to be unreasonable. We hope you agree to discuss a reasonable schedule for providing responsive records as well as any other issues that may bear on our request.

We have complied with your request to respond within 10 days, and we would appreciate your response to this letter also within 10 days. 

Please find attached Exhibit B referred to in our letter of December 13, 2019. It contains all the data available in public sources that address our requests to Summit Public Schools for the following:

13. For each Summit Public Schools high school, records of student graduation rates, reported student attrition rates, and reported student college and career readiness rates for each year that the school was open and data were collected.

18. Records of Summit Public Schools' college acceptance rates, completion rates, and graduation rates by demographic subgroups, for school years 2007-08 through 2018-19.

In your Exhibit A, your response to these requests was, "Information is publicly available on the California Department of Education's DataQuest / Dashboard. Public interest in allocating staff resources to pull publicly available data not demonstrated." As we mentioned in our letter of December 13, 2019, we sought the answers to our questions in the California Dashboard and the CDE's DataQuest database; and, because three Summit Schools are in Washington, in the Washington Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction's Washington State Report Card and the Washington State Charter School Commission's Performance Framework Reports. Although some of the requested data can be found in those places, not all of it can be. Also, it appears that some of the information in the public record may be inaccurate. For example, the California DataQuest database reports that Summit Prep had a 0% college and career readiness rate for the 2007-2008. That seems unlikely.



Dear Ms. Boninger and Mr. Molnar:

Thank you for your December 13, 2019 response and updates/comments to Exhibit A. Please note that, as of today, we have not received the Exhibit B referenced in your response. Please provide the document as soon as you are able.

In the meantime, I hope to provide some clarity with respect to my initial response, which appears to have raised legal and operational concerns for you.



- Your letter requests that I provide the authority for the assertion that you “must respond within 10 business days.” As you may be familiar, the California modeled its Public Records Act (the “CPRA”) after the federal Freedom of Information Act. Personally, I find it helpful to look to the federal guidance when responding to requests, the scope of which are unclear. The federal guidance recommends federal agencies ask requesters to clarify their requests within 20 working days. From my perspective, it is reasonable for a local agency, such as SPS, to ask for clarification within 10 business days to determine which open matters remain pending and which open matters are resolved.
- Thank you for the clarification that you are not requesting drafts or new records. The CPRA requires local agencies to notify a requester if there is exemption or privilege that prevents the disclosure of a potentially responsive record. Given the broad scope of your request, we were compelled to state that draft documents, if any, are exempt from disclosure even if they were within the scope of your request. In addition, several categories of your request imply that a responsive record could be created. As an example, your most recent email asks that we review the contents of Exhibit B and complete the missing information, which would constitute the creation of a new record. SPS appreciates your flagging areas of concern with publicly available information, and I will pass along your comments to staff.
- You are correct that Summit Public Schools created the Summit Learning Program and the Summit Learning Platform. Further, it is also true that the SPS schools participate in the Summit Learning Program and use the Summit Learning Platform. We do not dispute that *some* aspects of the Summit Learning Program and the Summit Learning Platform are within the scope of SB 126 (2019), specifically those aspects related to the operation of an SPS school. Senate Bill 126 (2019) clarified that “to the extent a governing body of a charter school or an entity managing a charter school engages in activities



that are unrelated to a charter school...the California Public Records Act ....shall not apply with regard to those unrelated activities unless otherwise required by law.” Accordingly, to the extent activities relating to the Summit Learning Program and the Summit Learning Platform are unrelated to the operation of an SPS school, they are exempt from the Public Records Act. In any event, certain records relating to the Summit Learning Program are no longer retained by or accessible to SPS nor do we have authority to demand such records.

- Thank you for clarifying that your request seeks information relating to Summit Public School: Atlas, Summit Public School: Olympus, and Summit Public School: Sierra, which are operated by Summit Public Schools Washington. To further your research project, the State of Washington’s Office of Public School Instruction provides data relating to schools in the state on its Data Administration Page (<https://www.k12.wa.us/data-reporting/reporting/data-administration>) and Washington State Report Card page (<https://washingtonstatereportcard.ospi.k12.wa.us/>)
- You state in “Exhibit A” “Summit Public Schools created the Summit Learning Program and created T.L.P. Education as a separate entity. Therefore, Summit Public Schools, in the course of its operations, would necessarily have knowledge of and records describing the legal status of T.L.P. Education.” SPS created the Summit Learning Program, but SPS did not create T.L.P. Education as a separate entity or otherwise. To further your inquiry, SPS would recommend contacting T.L.P. Education and/or visiting the State of California Secretary of State’s webpage, which hosts entity documents for organizations such as SPS. I assume the Secretary of State hosts entity documents from T.L.P. Education as well.
- You have asked SPS to create a record consisting of the “the job titles of personnel required to fulfill the requests, their respective rates of pay, and the time required by personnel in each job category to produce the records requested.” The CPRA does not obligate local agencies to create new records not kept in the ordinary course of business.
- Your letter requests an “explanation of why you expect it to take as long as you suggest to conduct a diligent search for documents responsive to each of the requests we have made” The CPRA does not require the explanation that you have requested. Nevertheless, SPS hopes to provide certain records, which were not marked as “scope of request unclear” at earlier dates. You should expect to receive documents in batches based upon staff availability.
- Your letter references an earlier informal request for information. I understand that a member of our staff relayed that, after internal consultation, SPS was unable to accommodate your request at the time. As you can imagine, providing records on an accelerated timeframe would cause some of the same employees who expressed that they did not have capacity to assist your research project to vacate their day-to-day projects and long-term projects to assist your research project. To the best of my knowledge, the



CPRA does not require local agencies to reallocate and reprioritize resources in this fashion.

SPS acknowledges our obligation to disclose responsive records that can be located with reasonable effort (i.e. a search that is reasonably calculated to locate responsive documents). In accordance with the CPRA, we expect to undertake a reasonable search for responsive records (subject to, in certain cases, clarity regarding the records you seek). If you prefer that we limit the scope of our search and provide only those certain documents we can locate with reasonable effort by a specified date, we can accommodate that request.

As an update, I expect to share a response to your revised Exhibit A in January. The entire Summit Public Schools organization will be closed until January 6, 2020. Thank you.

Below we respond to specific points made in your December 22, 2019 letter.

Your point 2 begins: "Thank you for the clarification that you are not requesting drafts or new records."

Our response to your point 2:

We hope that Summit Public Schools will agree to review and complete Exhibit B and correct, if necessary, any errors in the public record.

Your point 3 begins: "You are correct that Summit Public Schools created the Summit Learning Program..."

Our response to your point 3: Are we correct that your response is that although Summit Public Schools created and promoted the use of the Summit Learning Program and Summit Learning Platform by schools not part of the Summit Public Schools charter network, that Summit Public Schools has no records related to the creation and promotion of the Summit Learning Program and Summit Learning Platform?

Your point 4 begins: "Thank you for clarifying that your request seeks information relating to..."

Our response to your point 4: Thank you for pointing us to the public sources of information regarding Summit Public Schools' schools in Washington. As you can see in Exhibit B, which you now have, some of the data we are seeking is not available on those sites. If you do not provide this information or do not explicitly inform us that Summit Public Schools does not have records containing the information we have requested, may we infer that the Summit Public Schools does not have responsive records?

Your point 5 begins by noting that we: "... state in 'Exhibit A' 'Summit Public Schools created the Summit..." You then assert: "SPS did not create T.L.P. Education as a separate entity or otherwise."

Our response to point 5: Your response contradicts Summit Public Schools' published material ("We determined that this was the right time to launch a new nonprofit organization dedicated specifically to the Summit Learning Program...") in *Excellence is Equity: Summit Public Schools End-of-Year Summary 2018–19* [p.39], <https://drive.google.com/file/d/1M5oisCLwRLeRdtHxpl7yT3v6j5yf96aD/view>).

It is clear in the public record that Summit Public Schools did in fact create T.L.P Education. Please provide us with records related to the creation of T.L.P. by Summit Public Schools.

Your point 6 begins: "You have asked SPS to create a record consisting of "the job titles of..."

Your point 7 begins with "Your letter requests an 'explanation of why you expect it to take as long..."

Our response to your points 6 and 7:

To clarify, we are not requesting a "new record," we are asking for the specific information (i.e., "the job titles of the personnel required to fill the requests, their respective rates of pay, and the time required by personnel in each job category to produce the records requested") we would need to assess any costs Summit Public Schools would propose to levy related to producing the records we have requested.

Please provide us with the authority on which you rely to charge fees and costs for the time used by Summit Public Schools personnel to produce responsive records.

If you do in fact have such authority, we need to know (as we have already specified) the itemized record of cost of the time needed by Summit Public Schools personnel to produce the responsive records we have requested, as well as the amount and justification for any fees charged.

We reiterate our request that all charges be waived because the University of Colorado Boulder is a nonprofit organization.

Your point 8 begins: "Your letter references an earlier informal request for information...."

Our response to your point 8: To clarify the nature of our informal request, it was not the case that we asked the Summit Public Schools to devote an unreasonable amount of time to respond to us.

Faith Boninger spoke with Cat Uong, Summit Public Schools Manager of Development & Partnerships, on the phone on October 16, 2019. At Ms. Uong's request, Boninger put her request in an email on October 17, 2019, explaining that she was asking to interview someone at Summit Public Schools "knowledgeable about the history and development of Summit Public Schools and the Summit Learning Program," who could "direct [her] to answers to [her] questions in public sources or, if that's not possible, answer the questions directly." As you can see in the attached transcript of the full email correspondence, Ms. Uong represented Summit Public Schools' senior leadership team when she responded that Summit Public Schools was "not able to accommodate [us] at this time." Ms. Uong did not, in the correspondence, ask how long the interview might take or suggest when Summit Public Schools might be able to accommodate our request, if not at that time.

We appreciate Summit Public Schools' intention to fulfill its obligation to disclose responsive records that can be located with reasonable effort. In our December 13, 2019 response to your Determination Letter, we

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expressed continued willingness to have informal conversations with relevant Summit Public Schools representatives to gather the information we are seeking.

Is Summit Public Schools willing to have such an informal conversation at this time?


